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Dear Reader.

Breakfast is the most important meal of the day, and studies show that children who face hunger are being left behind. Too many Texas children who participate in the free and reduced-price National School Lunch Program do not participate in the School Breakfast Program. We have enough resources in the state to address food insecurity; however, these resources are often insufficiently organized or utilized. The School Breakfast Program is an important resource with currently limited accessibility.

Fortunately, due to the tireless efforts of anti-hunger advocates in the 83rd Texas Legislative Session, we have the momentum to match the moral drive to increase participation in the School Breakfast Program. This is an exciting time for the state of Texas.

Further, the Texas Hunger Initiative is helping to improve breakfast participation by working with local school districts to implement innovative breakfast models such as Breakfast in the Classroom and Grab and Go Breakfast. These models fit seamlessly into the school day, enhance participation in breakfast, and reduce stigma.

We are grateful to all of our partners who are diligently working alongside us to expand the reach and impact of the existing School Breakfast Program. A special thanks to Share Our Strength's No Kid Hungry campaign team, Dairy MAX, and the Food Research and Action Center. ### Introduction

#### Food Insecurity

Currently, 4.8 million Texans are food insecure.<sup>1</sup> Texas has a household food insecurity rate that is significantly higher than the national average (along with six other states).<sup>2</sup> This means that at some point in the last year, food insecure families either experienced hunger outright or altered their consumption patterns to avoid hunger. Food insecurity is defined by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) as "a household-level economic and social condition of limited or uncertain access to adequate food."<sup>3</sup> The phrase "food insecurity" is often used interchangeably with "hunger."

Food insecurity does not discriminate. Families can become food insecure with one simple pay cut or layoff. In fact, two million food-insecure Texans make too much money to receive Supplemental Nutrition Asstance Program (SNAP) benefits.<sup>4</sup>

In 2012, households with higher rates of food insecurity than the national average included the following:

- households with children (20.0 percent) households with children headed by single women (35.4 percent)
- households with children headed by single men (23.6 percent)
- Black, non-Hispanic households (24.6 percent)
- Hispanic households (23.3 percent)<sup>5</sup>

The percentage of child food insecurity in Texas is more than the national average. In 2011, Texas had a significantly higher child food insecurity rate (27.6 percent) than the national average (22.4 percent).<sup>6</sup> This means that many of these kids may regularly go to school having not eaten breakfast. They may not have eaten much over the weekends either.

Currently, 3,189,192 Texas school children gualify for free and reduced-priced (FRP) meals at school; however, 1,951,786 of those children do not participate in school breakfast.<sup>7</sup> Many schools serve breakfast *before* the first bell, giving students little or no opportunity to eat before class.

Texas law now requires public and open-enrollment charter schools with at least 80 percent of students eligible for free and reduced-price school meals to offer free breakfast to all students.<sup>8</sup> Additionally, alternative service models exist to

increase school breakfast participation and ensure that children have a nutritious start to the day.

#### **Texas Hunger Initiative**

The Texas Hunger Initiative (THI) is a statewide capacitybuilding project within the Baylor University School of Social Work that works collaboratively with national, state, and local partners to increase food security in Texas. THI implements strategies to alleviate food insecurity through research, policy, education, and community organizing. It convenes government stakeholders with nonprofits, faith communities, and business leaders to maximize existing resources and to develop and implement plans to increase Texas families' ability to access healthy foods.

THI's innovative approach to public-private collaboration has also demonstrated success in specific child nutrition program outreach. THI partners with USDA and Dairy MAX, a nonprofit organization affiliated with the National Dairy Council, to help interested school districts implement alternative school breakfast models that allow all children to eat during the first 15 minutes of class. Examples of these models include Breakfast in the Classroom (BIC), Grab and Go, and Breakfast After First Period. All three organizations bring something unique to the table. USDA brings federal money for food reimbursements, Dairy MAX brings private grant money for start-up costs (such as trash cans, cold cases, and warming carts), and THI recruits school districts.

#### School Breakfast Programs

The School Breakfast Program (SBP) is designed to ensure that all children start the day with breakfast. Schools are eligible to receive federal reimbursement for breakfasts served to children through the School Breakfast Program, though many schools do not participate. Even in schools that serve breakfast, participation is often low when compared to total enrollment or participation in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP).<sup>9</sup>

Studies suggest that skipping breakfast can keep children from reaching their full potential. Some findings show that eating breakfast not only decreases the risk of food insecurity for children but also decreases their absenteeism and behavioral problems while increasing their potential for learning.<sup>10</sup> Other studies highlight that school breakfast participants are also more likely to consume diets that are adequate or exceed standards for important vitamins and minerals.<sup>11</sup> Additionally, some studies suggest that school breakfast may protect against childhood obesity.<sup>12</sup> Fortunately, there are federal resources already available to ensure kids start their day with nutritious food.

#### **Key Statistics**

• Texas served 309,916,119 total breakfasts during the 2012-2013 school year for a state reimbursement of \$485.323.072.<sup>13\*</sup>

• At the end of the 2012-2013 school year, Texas had 60.1 percent statewide participation in the School Breakfast Program.\*

• If each school district included in this analysis reached the goal of serving 70 FRP eligible students per 100 FRP eligible students eating lunch, the state would receive \$84,635,101 in additional reimbursement.14\*\*

Children who are hungry are more likely to be hyperactive, absent, tardy, and have more frequent behavioral and attention problems.<sup>15</sup>



Students who participate in school breakfast show improved attendance and behavior as well as decreased tardiness.<sup>16</sup>

Participants in school breakfast are more likely to consume diets that meet or exceed the recommended daily amounts of vitamins and minerals.<sup>18</sup> PRINCIPAL

School breakfast has been linked with fewer visits to the school nurse, particularly in the morning.<sup>20</sup>



Studies are not from randomized samples. These studies cannot draw generalizable cause-andeffect conclusions. Children experiencing hunger have shown lower math scores and are more likely to repeat a grade.<sup>21</sup>

### School Breakfast Program

#### **Program Overview**

The School Breakfast Program (SBP) is a federally-assisted meal program for students in public, nonprofit private institutions, and residential child-care institutions. The program began as a pilot in 1966 and became a permanent program in 1975. On the federal level, the program is administered by the United States Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service (USDA-FNS). On the state level, it is administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). The program requires qualifying schools to offer meals at free and reduced-price rates and to meet federal nutrition requirements. The SBP operates similiarly to the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). Districts and independent schools can choose to serve breakfast to students before school or sometime during the morning. Traditionally, students' families fill out an application at the beginning of the school year to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price meals (FRP).<sup>30</sup> The Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 enacted new provisions and regulations that are detailed in this section.

#### Federal Legislation: Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010

In 2010, Congress passed Public Law 111-296, known as the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act (HHFKA). The following programs were addressed in this legislation: the National School Lunch and Breakfast programs, the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), the Afterschool Meal Program, and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Ed.)<sup>31</sup> Provisions relating to the School Breakfast Program include the Community Eligibility Option, improving direct certification processes for students, enhancing school nutrition quality, authorizing grants for expansion of School Breakfast Programs, and new school food financing provisions.<sup>32</sup> These provisions will be phased in according to the USDA Food and Nutrition Services implementation timeline. Certain provisions such as school certification are currently in the implementation process. The HHFKA provisions timeline can be found in Appendix A. #### State Legislative Highlight

During the Texas 83rd Legislative Session, Senate Bill (S.B.) 376, championed by Senator Eddie Lucio, Jr., was introduced and passed. S.B. 376 requires all school districts and open enrollment charter schools where 80 percent or more of students qualify for free and reduced-price meals to offer breakfast at no charge to every student.<sup>33</sup> The bill passed among a display of bipartisan effort. Advocacy groups such as the Texas Food Bank Network, the Christian Life Commission,

Texans Care for Children, Children at Risk, the Center for Public Policy Priorities, Texas Impact, and numerous others worked with stakeholders to ensure passage of the bill. S.B. 376 passed the Senate on April 23, 2013, the House on May 9, 2013, and was signed into law May 24, 2013. The law took effect September 1, 2013, for the 2014-2015 school year.

The purpose of S.B. 376 is to increase participation in the School Breakfast Program and ensure children in economically disadvantaged schools receive adequate nutrition to begin the school day. Excluding schools that already serve universal free breakfast, S.B. 376 will potentially impact approximately 1,600 campuses during the 2013-2014 school year.<sup>34</sup>

#### Eligibility

Schools must offer meals at full price, reduced-price, or free to students. There are four methods of determining the basis of eligibility for school meals.

#### **Categorical Eligibility**

A child in foster care, Head Start, considered homeless, migrant, or living in a household receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits, Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), and/or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) is eligible to receive free meals.35

#### **Direct Certification**

Similar to categorical eligibility, any child in foster care, Head Start, considered homeless, migrant, or living in a household receiving SNAP, FDPIR, and/or TANF is eligible for free meals. The difference with direct certification is that eligible children do not have to fill out a paper application. Instead, children are certified via a data exhange between the corresponding agency, such as Health and Human Services, and the school district.36



This school would have a free reimbursement rate of 80% and a paid reimbursement rate of 20%, because 100% minus 80% equals 20%.

If this school served 1,000 breakfasts in one month, 800 would be claimed for free reimbursment, and 100 would be claimed for paid reimbursement.



#### Income-based Eligibility

When a child is not categorically eligible and/or directly certified, eligibility for free, reduced-priced and paid meals is determined by household income.<sup>37</sup> A child from a household living at 130 percent of the federal poverty level or below is eligible for free meals. Children from households living at 185 percent or below the poverty level are eligible for reduced-price meals. A child from a household living above 185 percent of the poverty level must pay full price for meals.<sup>38</sup> For the 2012-2013 school year, annual income for a household of four living at 130 percent of the poverty level was \$29,965.<sup>39</sup> For a household of four living at 185 percent of the poverty level was \$29,965.<sup>39</sup> For a household of four living at 185 percent of the poverty level, annual income was \$42,643.<sup>40</sup> The current rates for the 2013-2014 school year can be found on the USDA Food and Nutrition Services website at http://www.fns.usda.gov/sites/default/files/IEG\_Table-032913.pdf.

#### **Community Eligibility Option**

The Community Eligibility Option is a provision of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act. This option eliminates the need for paper applications at schools with higher percentages of lowincome students. Instead of students filling out applications, schools base eligibility on the percentage of identified students that meet the Direct Certification criteria. A school is eligible to use the Community Eligibility Option when 40 percent or more of students qualify as identified students.<sup>41</sup> Schools can partner with other schools, or collectively as a school district, to meet the 40 percent eligibility requirement.<sup>42</sup> According to the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC), schools that meet the 40 percent requirement typically have 75 percent or more of students qualifying for free or reduced-price meals.<sup>43</sup> Schools can offer breakfast and lunch free of charge to all students through the Community Eligibility Option.

The reimbursement method for the Community Eligibility Option is calculated by the following:

> • Percent Identified Students x 1.6 = Percent meals reimbursed at free rate; the rest are reimbursed at the paid rate.<sup>44</sup> Participating schools are guaranteed the same reimbursement rate for four years. The rate can increase if the percentage of identified students increases within the four years.

The following example from Share Our Strength's No Kid Hungry Campaign Best Practices shows how the Community Eligibility Option meal claiming and reimbursement works (also above):

- If Banneker Elementary School has 100 students and 50 are considered identified students, the identified student percentage is 50 percent. The school would then multiply 50 x 1.6 to yield a free reimbursement rate of 80 percent and a paid reimbursement rate of 20 percent. If Banneker Elementary served 1,000 breakfasts in a month, 800 would be claimed for free reimbursement while 200 would be claimed for paid reimbursement.<sup>44</sup>
- If a school has 62.5 percent identified students, it reaches the threshold at which all meals can be claimed for free reimbursement.<sup>46</sup>

The Community Eligibility Option was piloted in Illinois, Kentucky, and Michigan during the 2011-2012 school year.<sup>47</sup> During the 2012-2013 school year, Washington, D.C., New York, Ohio, and West Virginia were included to offer the Community Eligibility Option to schools.<sup>48</sup> Georgia, Florida, Maryland, and Massachusetts were added for the 2013-2014 school year.<sup>49</sup> Beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, the Community Eligibility Option will be offered nationwide. By May 1, 2014, states must publish lists of all schools that are eligible for the Community Eligibility Option and all schools that are near-eligible.50

#### Nutrition Requirements

When preparing breakfast for students, schools must comply with federal nutrition guidelines. Each breakfast must include fruits and vegetables, a grain, a meat or meat alternative, and milk. The Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 included new provisions to improve the quality of school breakfast and lunch.<sup>51</sup> One of the key provisions called for the USDA to issue new meal nutrition standards consistent with the *Dietary Guidelines for Americans.*<sup>52</sup> According to the Food Research and Action Center, in January 2012 the USDA issued the new standards which:

- increase the amount of fruit and vegetables served;
- emphasize whole grain-rich foods;
- require lower fat and nonfat milk only;
- limit calories:
- reduce saturated fat and sodium:
- require lunch standards to be implemented during the 2012-2013 school year;

- phase in implemenation of school breakfast standards over a three-year period;
- allow "offer versus serve" fruit and vegetable servings consistent with the Institute of Medicine recommendations; and
- improve cultural food options, such as allowing tofu to gualify as a meat/meat alternative.53

#### **Reimbursement Rates**

The USDA reimburses schools for each eligible breakfast distributed. For the 2012-2013 school year, schools classified as non-severe need received \$1.55 for each free meal, \$1.25 for each reduced-price meal, and \$0.27 for each paid meal.<sup>54</sup> Schools receive extra money if they are classified as "severeneed." To gualify, a school must have forty percent or more of meals distributed at free or reduced-price. During the 2012-2013 school year, schools classified as severe-need received \$1.85 per free meal and \$1.55 per reduced-price meal.<sup>55</sup> The current 2013-2014 school year reimbursement rates can be found on the USDA's website at http://www.fns.usda.gov/ cnd/governance/notices/naps/NAPs13-14.pdf.<sup>56\*</sup>

#### Application & Meal Claiming Procedures

The USDA-FNS requires schools to have students apply for FRP meals at the beginning of each school year to determine reimbursement rates using the income-eligibility method. In order to make this process easier and more efficient for schools, a school can apply via Provision 1, Provision 2, or Provision 3. These options offer different methods of filing applications for meal remimbursement.

#### Provision 1

- In order to be Provision 1, a school must have at least 80 percent of their students eligible for FRP meals. Children eligible for free meals only need to fill out an application every two school years. This reduces the burden of collecting applications each school year. All other children must be notified of their eligibility for reduced-price or paid meals.
- Schools must keep a daily record of meals distributed based on type of reimbursement claims. There is no requirement with this provision to serve meals at no charge to all students.<sup>57</sup>

#### Provision 2

Provision 2 reduces the burden of applications, meal counts, and claiming for reimbursements due to the following:

- Schools that choose this provision only need to collect applications and take meal counts every four years. During the first year, or base year, the school establishes eligibility determinations, takes meal counts, and then applies those numbers to the next three school years. During the next three years, the school makes no new eligibility determinations and counts only the total number of reimburseable meals served each day. Reimbursement during these years is determined by applying the percentages of free, reduced-price, and paid meals served during the corresponding month of the base year to the total meal count for the claiming month. The base year is included as part of the four years.
- Federal reimbursement is given as a percentage of the base year reimbursement adjusted for enrollment and inflation.
- Schools must serve breakfast to all students at no charge for all four years. At the end of the fourth year, a school can choose to reapply for another four years

if the income level of the school's population remains stable.

 Schools implementing this alternative must pay the difference between federal reimbursement and the cost of providing all meals at no charge. The money to pay for this difference must be from sources other than federal funds.<sup>58</sup>

#### **Differences in Provision Requirements**

**Provision 1**: No requirement to serve breakfast at no charge. Eligibility certification every <u>two</u> years.

<u>**Provision 2**</u>: Requirement to serve breakfast at no charge. Eligibility certification and claiming percentages every <u>**four**</u> years.

**Provision 3**: Same requirements as Provision 2, with the addition that schools receive the same level of Federal cash and commodity assistance for a **four**-year period.

#### Provision 3

Provision 3 is similar to Provision 2 with regards to the reduction in application burdens, meal counting, and claiming procedures. Under this provision, schools are allowed to receive the same total federal reimbursement and commodity assistance each year, with some adjustments, for a four-year period.

- Provision 3 schools must serve meals at no cost to all participating children for a period of four years. These schools do not make additional eligibility determinations. A school can collect data for a base year and then apply that to the following four years.
- Federal reimbursement is the same for all four years, adjusted for changes in enrollment and inflation. The base year is not included as part of the four years.
- When the four-year period is over, an extension can be requested by the school. If the income level of the school's population remains stable, TDA may approve a four-year extension.

Similar to Provision 2, schools electing this alternative must pay the difference between federal reimbursement and the cost of providing all meals at no charge. The money to pay for this difference must be from sources other than federal funds.<sup>59</sup>

#### Universal-Free School Breakfast Program

An option for schools serving breakfast is to offer all students breakfast free of charge, regardless of income, through Provision 2 or Provision 3. Schools that use the Community Eligibility Option as the basis for free, reduced-price, and paid (FPR) meals eligibilty can also offer breakfast at no charge. This is called Universal-Free School Breakfast. The higher the percentage of students qualifying for FRP meals the greater the reimbursement a school could receive when serving all meals free. Generally, schools need to be at least 40 percent FRP to break even when serving all meals free. Other schools find that they need at least 60 to 70 percent of students who qualify for FRP meals. The break-even point depends on the size of the school and the cost to run the breakfast program.

The purpose of the Universal-Free School Breakfast program is to increase the accessibility of the School Breakfast Program. Universal-Free School Breakfast, when paired with an alternative service model, can increase both program accessibility and participation.

### School Breakfast Service Models



Along with the traditional breakfast model, there are five alternative service models for school breakfast: Breakfast in the Classroom, Grab and Go Breakfast, Breakfast After First Period, Breakfast on the Bus, and Vending Machines.

#### TRADITIONAL BREAKFAST

Traditional school breakfast is a common approach to serving breakfast and is usually served in the cafeteria before the school day begins. Often, schools find participation to be low when students are required to get to school before the bell rings to eat breakfast in the cafeteria. Various factors can limit children's access to breakfast before the bell, including:

- School buses do not arrive in time for breakfast.
- Long lines in the cafeteria discourage participation
- When given an option, many children will choose to spend time with friends or play outside before class begins.
- Traditional breakfast is often associated with "poor students." When students feel stigmatized about their need to eat at school, participation will be low.

Despite these challenges, it is possible to make traditional cafeteria breakfast more accessible. Some schools have high participation in serving breakfast before the bell. Strategies for increasing the success of this service model include:

- ensuring that all buses arrive in time for school breakfast;
- having students enter the building at the door closest to the cafeteria;
- making eating in the cafeteria a normal and fun part of the day.

The traditional model can increase breakfast participation and decrease stigma when coupled with Universal-Free School Breakfast.

#### Alternative Service Models for Breakfast



BREAKFAST IN THE CLASSROOM

Serving Breakfast in the Classroom (BIC), either during homeroom or first period, is one of the most effective ways of increasing breakfast participation. It is often thought of as the "silver bullet" in making sure that all children have access to school breakfast. Breakfast is brought into each classroom in containers that keep the food hot or cold. Meals are distributed to children and a meal count is taken by the teacher or by cafeteria staff and is then returned to the school nutrition staff. In some schools, food service staff distribute meals in the doorway of the classroom. Trash bags are provided to each classroom and trash is collected immediately. The containers are returned to the cafeteria. During breakfast, teachers often eat their students, take attendance, and read or provide other educational activities. Because all students eat breakfast as a normal part of the school day, in-classroom breakfast eliminates the stigma often associated with traditional school breakfast. This model also addresses barriers such as late bus arrivals and children's preferences for spending breakfast time with friends. In most schools, breakfast is also served free to teachers and staff who can then model good eating habits for the students. While this alternative service model works best when all meals are served free, it is possible in schools that charge for reduced and full-priced meals as well.



Grab and Go is a popular alternative model for serving breakfast, especially in middle and high schools. Food is distributed in carts that are located in high-traffic areas in halls or at the entrance to the school. Children "grab" a meal and "go" to their next class where they eat their breakfast. Depending on the point of sale system in place in a school, this can work in schools where breakfast is free for all students or in schools that charge for reduced-price and paid meals.



#### BREAKFAST AFTER FIRST PERIOD

Many children, especially teenagers, are not hungry when they first wake up in the morning, but sometime before lunch their stomachs start to grumble. Breakfast After First Period, also known as "Second Chance Breakfast," allows these students to eat when they are hungry. Food is distributed during a "nutrition break" later in the morning. This can be done with the Grab and Go model between classes or during an official break in the school day. This alternative service model can be employed in schools with the Universal-Free Breakfast Program or in schools that do not serve free breakfast to all students.



In school districts where the majority of students have long bus rides to school, serving Breakfast on the Bus can help students get through a long commute and arrive at school focused and ready to learn. Using this model, food is kept in containers and served to students as they get on the bus. This alternative service model is usually employed by schools that serve Universal-Free breakfasts.



Some schools employ models where students can enter their student ID or PIN number into a machine that will produce a reimbursable meal, including milk. This alternative service model is especially popular in high schools and can be implemented even if a school is not participating in the Universal-Free Breakfast program.

### School Breakfast Participation

#### **Overview of Tables**

For the 2012-2013 school year, school breakfast, including free and reduced-price (FRP) participation, increased statewide, illustrated in Table 2. In addition, this section provides a snapshot of school districts with the greatest increase in FRP participation 2010-2011 and 2012-2013. Table 3 shows the 20 public school districts with the greatest participation rate increase across three years (charters were excluded for this portion). Hart, Spurger, Garner, Alice, Lovejoy and Dilley more than doubled their school breakfast participation between the school years 2010-2011 and 2012-2013.

### School District Success Strategies

#### School District Highlights

Schools across Texas looking to implement programs, such as Breakfast in the Classroom, face the task of transitioning from a traditional style of breakfast served before the bell to an alternative breakfast service model. There are a variety of factors to address during the implementation process. The purpose of this section is to share successful strategies by highlighting different school districts around the state that offer alternative breakfast service models. While the listed topics are not exhaustive, they do provide some key starting points when walking through the implementation process.

#### **Overview of Highlighted Districts**

#### Brady ISD

Brady ISD, located in Brady, Texas (McCulloch County), offers Universal-Free School Breakfast. The district uses a hybrid of the Grab and Go and Breakfast in the Classroom model. Elementary and high school students receive their breakfasts at designated kiosks in hallways. Only first and second grade students go to the cafeteria to pick up their breakfasts. Students then go to their classrooms to eat their breakfasts.<sup>60</sup>

#### **Edgewood ISD**

Edgewood ISD, located in San Antonio, Texas (Bexar County), offers Universal-Free School Breakfast. Breakfast in the Classroom has operated in the district for more than 15 years. The district has around 12,000 students and serves Breakfast in the Classroom at 17 schools. Breakfast is brought to the classrooms on carts where teachers and students eat together.61

#### Lockhart ISD

Lockhart ISD, located in Lockhart, Texas (Caldwell County), offers Universal-Free School Breakfast, Lockhart ISD implemented Breakfast in the Classroom in 2010, and seven out of eight campuses offer the program. Breakfast is packed in two coolers, one for hot food items and the other for cold food items, for each classroom. Coolers are picked up each morning in the cafeteria and breakfast in consumed in the classroom. Waste is then disposed in trash cans placed in the hallways.62

#### Pleasanton ISD

Pleasanton ISD, located in Pleasanton, Texas (Atascosa County), offers Universal-Free School Breakfast. All seven campuses serve Breakfast in the Classroom. Breakfast is served after second period at the middle school and high school levels. The meals placed in each classroom in rolling coolers. Cafeteria staff deliver the rolling coolers to kindergarten and first grade classrooms. All other grade levels pick up the rolling coolers and take them to the classrooms.<sup>63</sup>

#### **Equipment and Supplies Expenditures**

Schools assess equipment and supply needs and consider what additional equipment and supplies are needed in order to implement an alternative service model. Supplies such as trash bags, paper towels, and wet wipes are often used in the cleanup process of Breakfast in the Classroom. Equipment such as carts, coolers, and bags can be used in the delivery process as well.

#### Success Strategies

Brady ISD uses kiosks set up at tables in halls around the cafeteria. The district did not have to purchase any extra equipment and saved money by utilizing existing resources.

Pleasanton ISD uses a rolling cooler with bags. The district received start-up grant funds from Dairy MAX and purchased cost-effective coolers were purchased through Walmart.<sup>64</sup>

Lockhart ISD and Edgewood ISD use two coolers for each classroom, one for hot and the other for cold food items. Lockhart ISD invested in regular beverage coolers, which proved more cost effective for the district than purchasing specialized breakfast carts.

Some schools have found it useful to add wet wipes to each class supply list at the beginning of each year in order to help stock clean-up supplies for the school year.

#### Food Vendors

When implementing an alternative breakfast model, it is important to communicate with food vendors in order to assess any changes to food purchasing.

#### Success Strategies

Brady ISD and Lockhart ISD noted the importance of finding out what can be purchased as individually-wrapped food items. Brady ISD found that purchasing these food items is more time efficient than cafeteria staff wrapping food items themselves.

Pleasanton ISD, along with several other districts, participated in a purchasing, cooperative for South Central Texas.

#### Time Management

Depending on the service model and amount of time available, breakfast can take as little as two minutes (Grab and Go), 10 minutes (Breakfast in the Classroom), or as long as the time available (traditional breakfast, Breakfast on the Bus). Multiple models allow schools to choose methods of service delivery that are contextualized to the school environment and needs of students. This way, breakfast can be seamslessly integrated into the school day.

#### **Success Strategies**

The delivery process and time eating at Brady ISD typically takes 10 minutes, respectively, for a total of 20 minutes. The district uses a ticket with the student name, teacher name, and a barcode that they exchange for their breakfast. Instead of hiring extra staff, Brady ISD uses available staff to work as aides at each kiosk.

Similarly, Lockhart ISD did not hire extra staff to implement the program. Rather, the district reallocated available cafeteria staff. The staff prepares the coolers in the morning, and has found it effective to allow students from each classroom to pick up the coolers and roll them to the classrooms.

Pleasanton ISD staff deliver breakfast to kindergarten and first grade classrooms. Older children pick up the meals and roll them to their classrooms. In order to make breakfast time more instructional, some schools in Pleasanton ISD incorporate health and nutrition lessons as part of the daily routine. As a result, students have the opportunity to eat and learn, which helps teachers efficiently expand instructional time.

#### Waste Management

Handling waste is a common concern when figuring out the logistics of alternative service models. It is important to alleviate any waste concerns principals, teachers, and staff many have to ensure the program runs smoothly for everyone.

#### Success Strategies

Brady ISD noted that individually-wrapped food items are easily recyclable. This is a valuable tip for schools that are concerned about reducing their waste.

Each classroom in Edgewood ISD has a trash bag to dispose of food. The trash is then collected by the staff, which means that teachers do not have to worry about trash remaining in the classroom.

Lockhart ISD places trash cans outside of the classrooms to collect waste. The building engineers empty the trash cans.

#### **Principals**

Working with principals is crucial to ensuring the success of any alternative breakfast model. To gain support from principals, it is important to communicate the program components effectively, as well as the overall benefits of breakfast for children.

#### **Success Strategies**

As a leader, the principal can motivate teachers and staff to embrace the program. The Breakfast in the Classroom program at Brady Elementary has proven successful due to the strong collaboration between the principal and the district School Nutrition and Food Service department.

Lockhart ISD found that the support of both the superintendent and principals was crucial to the implementation process. It is an asset to get everyone involved in the program together to collaborate on brainstorming, planning, and implementation. Pleasanton ISD echoed the importance of having school principals on board during the planning and implementation process. The district initially piloted a Breakfast in the Classroom program at one school and had significant success. The principal had the opportunity to observe the improved changes in student productivity and attendance firsthand. In turn, the increased breakfast participation and the observed benefits of the program helped motivate the principal, as well as the teachers, to continue Breakfast in the Classroom.

#### **Teachers**

Teachers have multiple roles within the school environment and are important in implementing a successful school breakfast program. Because teachers are at the frontlines of service delivery, effective communication with teachers is crucial both during and after implementation. Teachers should also feel supported in making the program successful in their classroom.

#### **Success Strategies**

Since Brady ISD utilizes a ticket exchange at kiosks as the point of sale, teachers do not have to claim meals, alleviating any concern that teachers may have about claiming meals properly. Also, since School Nutrition and Food Service produces the tickets for the students, teachers do not have to worry about adding extra tasks to their workloads.

Teachers at Edgewood ISD count and claim meals as part of the morning routine. The district provides training at the beginning of the year to teachers in order to ensure they understand the counting and claiming procedures. As an incentive, the district is able to feed teachers breakfast at no cost as well.

Pleasanton ISD also has teachers counting and claiming meals during breakfast. The district Food and Nutrition Services provides training to teachers on procedures, finances, and guidelines on meal counting and claiming. Cafeteria managers also visit with teachers to help with the process. In addition, Pleasanton ISD noted the importance of working closely with principals to reinforce the training throughout the year.



### Texas School Breakfast Goals

#### Increasing Participation in the School Breakfast Program

In order to reach the goal of 70 percent of eligible students participating in free and reduced-price breakfast in Texas, the state needs to serve breakfast to an additional 8,688 students per day. Texas aims to have 70 percent of students participating in free and reduced-price breakfast not only statewide but also at the district level. Meeting this goal will mean breakfast is served to an additional 8,688 students per day. If every school district in Texas reached the goal of serving free and reduced-price breakfast to 70 percent of students eating free and reduced-price lunch, the state would receive more than \$84 million in additional reimbursement.

#### School Breakfast Goals. Cont.

The table above shows what school districts with the largest potential participation increase and additional funding would receive if they reached a 70 percent free and reduced-price participation in the School Breakfast Program.

Texas' success in increasing participation in the School Breakfast Program over the past few years has largely been due to the implementation of alternative service models and Universal-Free Breakfast in schools. Schools with a high percentage of free and reduced-price eligible students are encouraged to explore the use of one of these alternative models for serving breakfast.

### Resources and Technical Notes

#### **Resources for Funding**

Dairy MAX is a nonprofit organization affiliated with the National Dairy Council and funded by the dairy farming families in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and southwest Kansas. Dairy MAX is a longtime supporter of the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs and has supported schools by allocating startup costs to provide nutrition education programs for teachers, expanding breakfast grants and promoting school programs such as Fuel Up to Play 60.

#### Resources

Dairy MAX has funds available for schools participating in the School Breakfast Program. These funds can help schools achieve the nutrition and academic benefits of greater breakfast participation through the establishment of an alternative service model such as Breakfast in the Classroom.

The goal of these grant-funded expansion programs is to increase average daily breakfast participation 50 percent or more by instituting one of the following alternative models for serving breakfast:

- Breakfast in the Classroom
- Grab and Go Breakfast
- Breakfast After First Period

Funds can be used to start and operate the alternative service models, but funds cannot be used for food, labor, or routine disposable items.

Examples of how funds can be used include:

#### **Technical Notes**

The data in this report are from the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA).

Due to rounding, the numbers in the tables may not add up to 100 percent.

#### **Student Participation**

Student participation data for the 2010-2011, 2011-2012, and 2012-2013 school years are based on daily averages of the number of breakfasts and lunches served during the school year, as provided by TDA.

#### **School Participation**

Tables that display data from the 2010-2011, 2011-2012, and 2012-2013 school years only display schools or districts that reported breakfast data to TDA for the three consecutive years.

These funds can help schools acheive the nutrition and academic benefits of greater breakfast participation through the establishment of an alternative service model.

Schools with free and reduced-price eligibility of 10% or higher are required to report to TDA the number of meals served each month. At the end of every school year, these numbers calculate total meals served for the school year. This report includes public schools and charter schools. If an institution is not listed, they either do not offer breakfast or did not report program data to TDA.

#### Statewide Data

This report uses the Food Research and Action Center's (FRAC) goal of a ratio of 70 children receiving free or reduced-price breakfast for every 100 children receiving free or reducedprice lunch. This report used the FRAC's School Breakfast Calculator to calculate the number of additional children who would be reached if each state reached this 70:100 ratio. The Calculator then multiplies this unserved population by the reimbursement rate for the number of school days of breakfast. Days of service for breakfast and lunch are inputted manually for each school year. Average Daily Participation (ADP) and dollars lost for the 2012-2013 school year were calculated using FRAC's School Breakfast Calculator. FRAC assumes each state's mix of free and reduced-price students would apply to any new participants, and conservatively assumes that no additional student's meal is reimbursed at the higher rate that severe need schools receive.

All data used in FRAC's School Breakfast Calculator are collected from TDA.

#### District-wide Data

The same method used to calculate statewide data was used to calculate district-wide data for number of additional children needed to reach a 70:100 breakfast to lunch ratio, as well as dollars lost.
